«A political thriller. Uneven, but getting across the feeling of times paralyzed just before falling off a cliff. Single-taken, so it creates a strong sense of being there, being included. A story of a young couple dreaming of a baby that accidentally got themselves into the slaughter of the after-election protests of 9th August. Young and in love, they drown in their happiness, jealousy, youth, each other. Had they stayed in their cozy suburbs, had they not given in to the urge to see what's happening, to become history witnesses, - the 'astronauts' with the bats wouldn't have burst into their life. 'Fucking Romeo!' 'Too many of them here, get 'em to Odoyevskogo! Hands behind your head! Head on the floor, camera on the floor! Smile, maggots!' That's practically verbatim theatre. An image of a country stuck in a sinister hallucination»

## PRESS RELEASE

The first narrative film about Belarusian protests in August 2020 — MINSK — was shot in Tallinn at the end of May. The single-take film tells a story of a young married couple, Yulia and Pasha, living in the Minsk suburbs. They had just got married, bought an apartment on credit and were planning to have a baby, but they accidentally got in the middle of the peaceful protests. An ordinary walk turns into a hell as innocent people become victims of police brutality... This film was created without any editing cuts.

MINSK is the fourth full-length film created by Boris Guts. The author has already proven himself as an experimental filmmaker and a public figure exploring poignant social themes: poverty, racism, homophobia.

### Boris Guts, the film's writer:

This film was the most challenging one for me. It's a slice of life made with no editing cuts, single-taken. I never wanted to show some sugar-coated fantasy flick, I want to show the reality, show that a totalitarian police state can destroy a life before your very eyes in an hour and a half, while you're still watching the movie.



One of MINSK's producers was a political consultant Vitali Shkliarov, who had lived through the depicted events himself. Vitaly was arrested in Belarus in 2020, spent a few months in jail and, like many other political prisoners in Belarus, was tortured during that time.

### Vitali Shkliarov, film's producer:

The Belarusian found themselves an occupied nation. They are constantly under the threat of physical and psychological violence and nobody can be sure this terror wouldn't come to their door. The Belarusian society is violated with fear: every minute, whatever you're doing, they can grab you. And you don't know what they would do to you. This country follow

MINSK has a vital mission to tell the truth about what happened in the capital of Belarus in August 2020 despite all prohibitions and attempts to cover it up on state level. The shooting was banned in Russia in the autumn 2020. Coproduction with Estonia was the solution; everything was run by Tallinn production LEO Film.

### Katerina Monastyrskaya, producer, Estonia:

MINSK doesn't depict the problems of Minsk and Belarus alone. Police harassment happens everywhere. That's why our film will be understood all over the world. We don't accept violence.


The leading actors are Anastasia Shemyakina and Alexei Maslodudov. Oleg Gaas, Yulia Aug, Ivan Mulin and others participated.

The Belarusian events in 2020 were the presidential campaign with the most bloodshed in the entire history of the post-USSR republic. According to official data, "the enforcers' reaction was justified by the provocation and disorderly conduct from the demonstrants". However if one researches various sources, these numbers come up:


Arrested: more than 33 thousand people

Wounded: 200-300 people Tortured: more than 450 people Went AWOL: from 6 to 76 people
